Portland's New Garden: *The Cloud Forest*

Bill Zanze, our speaker for the **October 20, 2011** meeting, describes himself as an extreme rhododendron enthusiast. He loves the species rhododendrons with their interesting foliage, rich history and collectors' tales and appreciates the need for the conservation of these unique plants. As a gardener in Washington Park, one of Bill's greatest joys has been the creation of *The Cloud Forest*, a rhododendron species garden nestled on the hillside in the northeast corner of the park. What began as a large-scale, multi-phase invasive plant removal project in this misused corner of the park, quickly morphed into an opportunity to implement a collection of rhododendrons to complement many of the existing ones in the park. Furthermore, the goals are to profile the range of types of rhododendrons that can be grown there and to enhance the ground layer with an eclectic mix of herbaceous companions of similar geographic origins. Bill will share his vision for this fledgling garden and discuss how it came to fruition, who the key players are, what the existing site characteristics are, as well as the process and sweat equity that has gone into getting the garden to this place.

Bill is a horticulturist for Portland Parks and Recreation, working in Washington Park and surrounding northwest neighborhood parks for the past seven years. Prior to this, he was with the Horticultural Services division where he maintained a field nursery at Mt. Tabor, growing, harvesting and marketing large caliper shade and flowering trees for the City and other non-profits. He also engaged in environmental education programs and native plant restoration projects. His strong interest in removing invasives and reclaiming park areas overgrown with such species including English ivy, Himalayan blackberry, English holly, hawthorn and others has been a driving force in his dedicated efforts in preserving and enhancing city parks.

Earlier in his career, while working in the retail nursery industry in Eugene, Bill developed a true passion for ornamental plants. He loves working with people and getting them excited about potential planting possibilities and has discovered that, ultimately, he really enjoys talking plants with people.

Following Bill's talk about the Cloud Forest, we will have fun with a species auction, so put October 20th on your calendar!

A Re-cap of our September 15th Meeting

Our speaker, Norma Senn from Victoria, B.C., treated us to a whirlwind trip into many beautiful gardens of the Pacific Northwest, *Walking in the Sasquatch's Footprints*. She showed us fine examples of plants happily growing in every kind of soil from bogs to screes and rock outcroppings. Moreover, Norma talked about the style of gardening that works with nature, not against nature, to create a "fusion" of the two. Certainly, planting among the fir trees and sword ferns is a style with which we are familiar and it is good to know that kind of gardening is actually called a style. Norma pointed out that it is fortunate, also, that we can embrace the influences of the European, the Japanese and the Chinese traditions when we garden here.

Norma integrated history about the people who influenced gardening in the Pacific Northwest, such as Dr. John McLoughlin, who created a seven-acre kitchen garden at Fort Vancouver out of necessity, into her talk. Archibald Menzies botanized and distributed our natural flora along with John Townsend and Thomas Nuttall (*Rh. nuttallii*) who explored the Pacific Northwest in the 1830's.

After Norma's talk, Kathy Van Veen demonstrated the art of making cuttings. Her signature "big thumb" that protects her from the sharp knife that she uses was firmly in place. Kathy also emphasized the importance of clean, fresh mix for cuttings and dipping cuttings in 'Phosan' to make sure the cuttings are free from bacteria and fungi. Kathy passed around her demonstration cuttings so everyone could get a closer look. Then, to end the meeting, we chose cuttings to try rooting at home.

Note: Bob MacArthur, who attended the meeting, was in considerable pain from his back, and was scheduled for surgery Saturday, October 8. We hope to have an update on his condition in time for the October meeting. In the meantime, we wish you a speedy recovery, Bob!

Lunch will be served to all workers.


Board Briefs: September 20, 2011
