The Lace Bug--A Pretty Name for a Bad Bug

As rhododendron growers and collectors, you may have noticed in your travels around the Pacific Northwest that some rhododendrons have small yellow dots on their leaves. These unsightly dots are caused by the lace bug feeding on the leaves. If you turn the leaves over, you will see a brown residue left behind by the lace bug and also used to cover the eggs during winter. Yuck! At its worst, a lace bug infestation will turn the leaves almost white.

It's Robin Rosetta to the rescue! For our January 19, 2012 meeting, Robin will speak to us about the lace bug and how to control its spread. Robin is an OSU Associate Professor whose base is the North Willamette Research and Extension Center. She works with Oregon greenhouse and nursery growers to meet their needs in the area of Integrated Pest Management (IPM). The Nursery IPM Extension program is a multi-dimensional information system which assists growers in making informed decisions about pest identification, monitoring, pest biology, thresholds, and pest management techniques. Robin will gear her talk to suit our needs as rhododendron collectors who manage our own gardens.

Robin's other ongoing research activities include: eriophyid mite management, amber snail management, intelligent spray systems and the use of predatory mites for reduction of root weevil larvae. We are grateful that Robin will speak to us about the lace bug so that we will have more tools with which to manage this pest.
