Highlights of the April Meeting

We enjoyed a busy meeting April 16th, with a timely presentation by Tom Valente, PhD, on the azalea lacebug invasion in Oregon, followed by our traditional hybrid rhododendron auction. First order of business was the election of 5 Nominees to our Board; our new Board members are: Dave Collier; Caroline Enns; Steve Hall; Steve Hopkins; and Bill Zanze. Thanks to all for agreeing to take on that extra responsibility.

Tom Valente is an entomologist with the Oregon Dept. of Agriculture, researching the 'azalea' lacebug. He first gave us some background on the goals and purpose of the ODA: to organize and enforce agricultural quarantines; to perform pest surveys; pest eradication and control efforts (Japanese beetle, gypsy moth, apple maggot, tansy ragwort, to name a few); operate the pest identification lab for the State of Oregon (with a very large reference collection of insects.) Tom then presented some lacebug statistics and history; there are between 50 -100 native lacebug varieties in the U.S; the azalea lacebug first turned up in Washington, D.C. in 1910 and an outbreak in New Jersey in 1916 was blamed on Japanese evergreen azaleas arriving from Japan. There is a native Japanese predatory insect now established in the Washington, D.C. area which possibly hitchhiked along with the azalea lacebug on those Kurume and Satsuki azaleas. At this point in time, under current rules and regulations, introduction of predatory insects from Japan or even Washington, D.C. will take a considerable amount of time, and money. The potential for damage to several of Oregon's cash crops, such as blueberries and hazelnuts, as well as rhododendrons, has ODA working hard to find solutions. The ODA will be creating new protocols for testing our West Coast lacebugs and possible predators. Tom's presentation stimulated several lively conversations with our members and guests.

What to do about the lacebug problem now? Our members' suggestions are: kelp sprays on the foliage, where it is absorbed by the leaves; summer weight dormant oil, neem oil, or insecticidal soap sprays on the undersides of the leaves; lastly, systemic insecticides, which are the most problematical. Biological controls: green lacewings, and also a 'fairy wasp' which parasitizes lacebugs. Control is a more realistic goal than eradication at this point, given the large range of host plants besides rhododendrons which are attacked by the azalea lacebug.

Our hybrid rhododendron auction was fun and entertaining. Some choice plants were on offer and bidding was spirited. If you would like to contribute plants to our annual auctions, please feel free to do so! Our thanks to everyone who participated for making a successful auction benefitting the Chapter.

Glowing Color on an Attractive Plant: Rhododendron 'Cody'

We are very fortunate in the Pacific Northwest to be able to grow H3 rhododendrons and even more tender ones, sometimes, in our gardens. The wonderful hues that they exhibit lure us into choosing plants from the hugely expanded color spectrum given to us by hybridizers such as Jim Barlup, Frank Fujioka, Don Wallace and the Thompsons. Through their hybridizing efforts, many newer rhododendrons are decorated with floral color combinations that impress us and make us wonder, "What's next?"

Our friends in the Eastern U.S. do not have such an expansive palette as ours from which to produce hybrids that withstand the extreme cold, high heat and humidity that they experience. Hoping to expand that color range in combination with greater hardiness has been one of the goals of Jim Barlup. Jim has crossed some West Coast hybrids with East Coast hybrids to provide both color and hardiness. An excellent example of his work in that area is R. 'Cody'

Here is more about R. 'Cody':

It is an elepidote, which means that it does not have scales on the underside of its leaves.

The cross is: 'Wind River' x 'Janet Blair' ('Wind River' is a Jim Barlup H3 hybrid and is yellow. 'Janet Blair' is a David Leach hybrid rated at -15 degrees hardiness and is a frilled light pink with a distinctive green flare.)

The leaves are oblong and medium green. They cover the structure of the plant nicely.

Each slightly frilled corolla is peachy pink with a large, bright tangerine flare. The corollas form a full truss.

This hybrid is well-branched. It will reach about 5 feet x 4 feet in 10 years.

The hardiness is untested; it is probably at least 0 degrees F.

Placement in your garden: It does well in full sun.

Directions to Mike and Maria's home 42125 SE Kleinsmith Road, Sandy, Oregon:

From the last signal light in the city of Sandy, take U.S. 26 east out of town for 2 miles.

Exit right onto Firwood Road. The landmark at this exit is a gas station/store combination called 'Shorty's'. Go 3/4 of a mile on Firwood Road, and then turn right at the 4-way intersection at the top of the hill. There is a Dover Nursery sign on a utility pole pointing to the right at this intersection. There is also a Dover Community Church sign pointing to the right at this intersection. This right turn will keep you on Firwood Road.

Go 2 1/2 miles further on Firwood Road, until you get to a 4-way stop at the intersection of Wildcat Mountain Drive and Firwood Road. Cross over Wildcat Mountain Drive and take the middle road, which is Kleinsmith Road. It goes slightly to the left and down the hill. There is also a sign pointing to the Dover Nursery at this intersection. Our home and nursery is 8/10 of a mile more on Kleinsmith Road, on the left side, across from the Dover Community Church.
